Liberty, Protest, and Petition: Analyzing a Primary Source

Definition "Primary Source": the raw materials of history—original documents and objects that were created at the time under study (Library of Congress)

Directions:

1. Source Description:

Provide a brief description of the primary source, including its type (letter, document, image) and date.

2. Elements of Protest:

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3. Elements of Petition:
