- "Primary Source": the raw materials of history—original documents and objects that were created at the time under study (Library of Congress)
- "Federalists" Federalists wanted to see a strong national government in which state governments were subordinate to the national government.
- "Anti-Federalists or Democratic-Republicans" Anti-Federalists wanted a new government in which state governments superseded the national government. They also insisted on adding the Bill of Rights to the Constitution.
